William Styron once said, "A great book should leave you with many experiences, and slightly exhausted at the end. You live several lives while reading." With this idea in mind, we want to encourage you to develop a new experience this summer through literature. When we return to school in August, you will be expected to discuss your reading with your classmates and complete a comprehensive assignment related to the book you read.

To guide your book selection, ask yourself these questions:

- What are you doing this summer for fun? Watching T.V.? Playing sports? Visiting foreign places? Playing video games?
- What are some of your hobbies/passions?
- What are things you would read or watch videos about even if you never had to go to school again?
- Who are some people that you admire?
- What are some places that you've visited that you'd love to go back to?

As you read your book,

- think about how you would tell someone else about it without telling the whole story
- read with a "pencil" in hand:
 - o highlight/underline specific parts of the book that stand out to you
 - o make notes in the margins (either directly on the page or on a Post-It note) about something you want to comment on What seems interesting? unusual? funny? surprising?

Summer Reading Requirements:

- 1) Any genre is allowed (fiction, non-fiction, graphic novel, self-help, etc.)
- 2) A MINIMUM of 200 pages
- 3) High school reading level (you may not read a book that was a part of the curriculum for middle school)
- 4) You **CANNOT** read a book that will likely be read in sophomore year (*The Catcher in the Rye*)
- 5) Choose a book about something that you are interested in!
